


Acknowledgement of Native American Homelands

We honor their elders, both past and present, and their descendants. We have the responsibility to carry out actions in unceded lands that will meaningfully involve citizens of these tribes.




COP 16 – Peace with Nature



Activity 2: Sharing Definitions?



Safe Clean Water Program

Nature-Based Solution means a Project that utilizes natural processes that slow, detain, infiltrate or filter Stormwater or Urban Runoff.

These methods **may** include: relying predominantly on soils and vegetation; increasing the permeability of Impermeable Areas; protecting undeveloped mountains and floodplains; creating and restoring riparian habitat and wetlands; creating rain gardens, bioswales, and parkway basins; and enhancing soil through composting, mulching, and planting trees and vegetation, with preference for native species.


Nature-Based Solutions **may** also be designed to provide additional benefits such as sequestering carbon, supporting biodiversity, providing shade, creating and enhancing parks and open space, and improving quality of life for surrounding communities.

Nature-Based Solution includes Projects that mimic natural processes, such as green streets, spreading grounds and planted areas with water storage capacity.







