

Nature-Based Solutions Task Force ***DRAFT*** Charter

I. Overview

(A) Los Angeles County Water Plan (CWP) Vision

A shared, inclusive, regional path forward to sustainably and equitably achieve safe, clean, and reliable water resources for Los Angeles County.

<u>(B) Mission</u>

To implement priority tasks from the CWP 2-Year Action Plan to support the use of nature-based water management solutions across the County to improve the health of communities and ecosystems.

(C) Priority Tasks

- 1. Develop Countywide definitions and standards for nature-based solutions.
- 2. Prioritize nature-based solutions (NBS) in stormwater capture projects.
- 3. Build upon the Safe, Clean Water Program (SCW Program)'s Metrics & Monitoring Study and <u>2022 Interim Guidance</u>.

(D) Desired Outcomes

The Task Force will support the SCW Program's Metric & Monitoring Study (MMS), Goal F: "Prioritize Nature-Based Solutions." NBS are currently being evaluated based on the Good, Better, Best (GBB) framework identified in the SCW Program's <u>2022 Interim Guidance</u> (Programming of Nature-Based Solutions). The development of more consistent definitions, specific standards, and refined scoring criteria is needed and will further benefit implementation of the SCW Program.

Task Force efforts will build upon previous feedback gathered during the development of the CWP and April 2024 Water Resiliency Summit. The Task Force will support progress towards relevant CWP targets and strategies such as:

- Target H: Increase groundwater recharge and storage by increasing decentralized infiltration by 80,000 AFY
- Strategy 10: Facilitating natural infiltration of precipitation

Additionally, the Task Force will support related targets detailed in the <u>California's</u> <u>Nature-Based Solutions Climate Targets</u> released in April 2024, including but not limited to:

- Wildfire Risk Reduction (Beneficial Fire and Other Fuel Reduction Activities)
- Developed Lands (Afforestation, Conservation, Urban and Community Greening and Forestry, and Reducing Community Wildfire Risks)



II. Task Force Structure & Governance

(A) Lead & Alternate(s)

Eileen Alduenda (CWH) / Jason Casanova (CWH)

(B) Support

LA County Public Works Staff / Council for Watershed Health

(C) Types of Participants

The Task Force may include participants from water management entities, state and federal agencies, non-governmental organizations, academia, and Tribes, as well as representatives that expressed interested during the Water Resiliency Summit. Participants will be expected to dedicate time to these efforts and provide continuity throughout their duration on the Task Force.

Task Force Lead = Sets the direction for the Task Force and determines the Priority Tasks to be pursued.

Task Force Members = Participate in meetings and provide advice and input.

Task Force Working Group(s) = This subgroup(s) of Task Force Members actively collaborate and work together on the Priority Tasks to develop materials and progress towards the Desired Outcomes. A Working Group lead will be identified.

(D) Consensus Building

Direction will be governed by either consensus or majority rule. Consensus requires participation from all group members, including those with minority opinions. Majority rule does not require a collective agreement.

(E) Charter Revisions & Updates

The Charter will be reviewed and revised every two-years.

III. Task Force Meetings

(A) Meeting Format

The Task Force will meet virtually, with in-person meetings as necessary.

(B) Meeting Recurrence

The Task Force will meet on a quarterly basis. Task Force Working Groups are anticipated to meet more frequently.

All CWP Task Forces may meet jointly once per year at an in-person half-day working session to showcase progress.



(C) Collaboration / Integration with Others

The Task Force will have an open membership. Active participation is encouraged; collaboration and open discussions among the members and other stakeholders will be conducted through the Greater Los Angeles County IRWM Leadership Committee, Upper Santa Clara River IRWM, Antelope Valley IRWM, SCWP Regional Oversight Committee and/or Watershed Area Sub-Committee meetings.

IV. Task Force Milestones

(A) Major Activities & Milestones

The activities of the Task Force will be guided by Directive 4 of the December 5, 2023, Board Motion, "Implementation of the Los Angeles County Water Plan: A Shared, Regional Path Towards Water Resilience," and the MOA between Los Angeles County Flood Control District and the Council for Watershed Health.
